Received £2 from
pay office to last until
Australia. Went to
Camp & said goodbye
to all my pals which
are only a few, the majority
of my pals are all
dead & buried. Norm
Cook of St. Kilda. He gave
me a hand with my
two kit bags before we
said adieu. I gave
him my spurs. I was
sad for both of us, both
being the oldest pals.

28th August 1915

Left Luna Park Hosp
8.40 A.M. Motored
to Palais De Habbok
left at 10.33 A.M. about
300 men were on
the Hospital train
arrived at Cental
Station 11.41 A.M. here
another hospital train
was joined on to our
train

28th August 1915
We left Cairo at 12.10.00 a.m.
followed by Waters, Sackley,
Cigarettes, Druggists etc. We
had 3 eggs & thin juice
issued to us. Saw Indian
entrapments & destruction &
damage done by the fight.
We were told we
would be camping
at the Port Suez Concentration
Camp & were very down hearted
were issued with
2. Pillows 1. Mattress
knife etc. & got bread
like bricks & water, &
could not have been
treated worse if we
had been prisoners.
We had roast chicken
etc. for lunch & was not
enough for a soldier.
Good many men were
the worst of drink, the
way we were treated
would drive a man
to drink, & some took

28th August 3
French leave. even
men who were in
crucifixes. The majority
of us had to buy only meals
while we were here.
29th August
Breakfast 6.30 Bedo
rolled up. 7.30. Moved
off to Station 8.30 AM
Arrived by 8.45. Moved
off 9 AM. Findings were
camped here, they
are a fine lot of
men. Saw Indians
coming in by a U.S.N.
liner. For bed. Ft. 134
S.S. baropodis. Had
very good dinner
left. Port Suez 3 PM.
Thank God we have
at last left Egypt
shore, & I don't wish
to see it again in a
hurry. We are now
in the Red Sea &
traveling a boat 15 knots
per hour this ship

14 29th August 1915. 
Can do 17 knots but
owing to one of the
propellers being broken
she has reduced her
speed. Am sleeping
in hammock tonight
but being a Sgt. Major
expect to have a Cabin
tomorrow. Today is
Sunday & it seems
very funny all our
adventures of any
importance take place
on a Sunday. The
name of the place where
we were camping is
Nabour. Naga. Camp
Station. We entered
the Red Sea about 4.30
P.M. very calm. Had
supper also discussion
of the Sgt's Mess. The
food so far has been
bonza & hope it shall
continue. Had a good
many jokes. I also
had made up my

29th August 1915 5
mind to sleep in a
hammock for the first
time & had no sooner
got into it & made
myself comfortable
when the rope gave
way & I came a box
of bricks on the paved
floor, so had then
to sleep on the mess
table although jolly
hard. made a fierce
bed, there are plenty
of cockroaches, but
do not make much
difference. One of the
wounded have a
morsel aboard & it
causes much amuse-
ment. Said my
prayers & went to sleep

30th August.
Rose at 6.30. Had
bonza HOT Sea Bath
had smoke. promised
the ship had read
had another bath.

cc (1) S
by 30th August 1915.
I am now ready
for dinner. Am
feeling much better &
enjoying the trip. They
natives are A. I. & hope
they shall continue
spent the afternoon on
deck 4. 6 goats passed
as. The sea is very
calm. Swollen light to
sea a little rough
weaker. The men
are all enjoying
the trip very much
and a very few
serious cases are
aboard. Saw several
flying fish had talk
seen hummingbird only
a few inches from the
floor. I don't wish to
have another fall
turned in at 10.30 P.M.
& perspired like a top
spent a miserable
night. Slept between
decks but not a fan.
for time. Fine Sun Set.

31. August 1915
A. I. at 6.15 AM. had
salt water shower
walked deck. Had
good appetite for
breakfast. Spent most
of the morning on deck.
Weather is beautiful.
Am not smoking
many cigarettes &
am feeling much
better. The pipe is my
favourite. Dinner
is just about ready
expect to be in Melbourne
Oct 2nd from all accounts
but in my opinion we
shall land Sept 26th.
I can hardly realise
we are on our way
home. & do not feel
at all excited. But when
we reach Port Melbourne
I suppose I shall
feel like a free man.
I have my good pals
on board. I think they
are all killers. There is

8 31st August 1915 (cc) (15)
Not much work on board
for those who are able.
Have now plenty of
Booklets. I do not wash
about very much, owing
to my heart being in a
bad state. We see a
several many flying fish
The forecast is not so
good now as I thought
it would be. Before
going to bed, the majority
in the S. S. Thos. buy
Cup of Tea & 2 or 3
cakes. total 3 are should
receive a free issue
of Supper but on
board this sugar
we don't. The weather
is terrible being 116°
this afternoon & is now
nearly the same 7 P.M.
had supper & tried
to get 40 winds but
it was far too hot
again. Slept down
below. During the

31st August 1915
Afternoon we were
issued with Life
Belts, also 40 Cigarettes
& 2 3/4 of tobacco but
I gave 11 PKts of Cigs
for 3 1/2 tobacco &
have now a fair
supply.
1st September 1915.
Up & had Hot & Cold
sea water bath by
6.30 AM. had a smoke
& read. Breakfast
at 7 AM. Had a
few trays
of Hamers. had some
of cards. read a
smoke. I seldom
smoke Cigarettes
now on account of
my heart. Slept
on Deck. Passed
the Hot & Cold
at 10.30. Slept
fairly well until
5.30 P.M. had
Bath. Smoke read.

1st September 10
After Breakfast had
a quiet rest.
Passed 12. A. M. at
Hayes Bridge
Tournament until
dinner & resumed
after dinner we
were beaten by
98. Have just had
a sea bath &
feel much cooler
Last night I went
up to the
to the forkal. & spent
an interesting
hour or so watching
the Dolphins in front
of our track they
were there in
numerous numbers.
Slept on deck. had
Miserable Night

2nd August 1915
Had a sea bath.
after breakfast
had a good smoke
played Bridge.

2nd September 10
all morning & resumed
after dinner. passed
Islands of
which form a
port for the red sea
looks a very desolate
place of ruins
one of Gallipoli
Peninsular. passed
light house also
2 ships of small
size. Morse Code
signalling took place.
news was received
from Aden
that the Gallipoli
Peninsular war
was progressing
favourably & certain
Turkish positions
had been captured.
Had read & talk
then had tea & coffee
watched the sea
for a while. A Gale
Wind sprang up
& heavy Scotch mist

2nd. September 1915. (cc 15)
a Ship was in our
course & the Capt
of our ship had
to be diving round to
Starboard to avoid
a Collision. Her
Sails were passed
during the night also
Mail Steamer. Slept
on Hatch I will sleep
fore. I spent a
miserable night
about 5.30 PM. War
ships passed.

3rd September
about 5.30 PM. Man
or war passed on
our Port Side. Had
Breakfast
smoked & played
Cricket. I have
broken down out
in a hot Rush.
is very uncomfortable
be going under
12 knots out to the

3rd. September 1915.
heat. Today is very
much cooler to the
last week, & a
change came last
night which was
appreciated. Am
now ready for
dinner. We
passed a bunch
of Salutes I don't
remember the name
of them. Coal charge
about 11 P.M. it
was delightful. No
news of any import
ance. Slept on
deck. Had. miserable
night. Had. Graphophone
Concert, also Monday
Performance. Some
General D.O.P. this
were seen. They
are very interesting
not many flying
fish have been
seen this trip Slept
on deck. & was disturbed

14 4th September
about 5 A.M. by
a boy turned on
me. I had slept
in a corner of the
deck & come hardly
to see, at any
rate I was sopping
wet. We are now
in the Indian Ocean
& by the look of things
I think we shall
have some rough
weather. Had 5 games
of Bridge this morning
Passing the St. Helena
Islands. Did a little
washing about 7.30
P.M. We had a rough
time a very heavy
sea was running
A. Concert. Arranged
by the Colonel took
place at 8 P.M.
He is a very fine
man & the concert
was a great success
It was quite chill

15. 4th September
When I went
up to the forecabin
after dark to get
my blankets they
had disappeared
I slept down below
had good night's
sleep.

5th September Sunday
Very nice & cool
morning. I thought
I was going to be sea
sick but after the
breakfast I have
eaten my breakfast
which was porridge
& Bacon. Had
bed & slept until
dinner. Spent all
afternoon had ten
-plead talk & slung
hammock & was
soon in lund
Dreams. Weather
rather cold. Nothing
of any importance

6th September

Most pleasant day
played bridge and
the evening saftes
in the afternoon
crossed the Equator
at 4 P.M. issued
with 40 cigarettes
flap not sporting to
good had tea played
bridge after tea took
tea. Slept 9 P.M.
I was feeling very
ill, my head full
my back aching
I was walking the
deck until 2 P.M.
felt like shooting
myself.

7th September

Feeling a little better.
played bridge most
of morning, fine
pleasant day.
had good rest
after dinner. did
a little washing
Went to bed at 8.30

8th September

Was S.O.S. Ships
orderly. Sergeant
had flg. up to
dog. coffee issued
for supper 8 P.M.
first time for the
trip.
Slept badly

9th September

Had a little sewing
had very rough
weather & heavy
of rain. We are
now meeting the
monsoon rain.
Slept well.

10th September

Weather very rough
about 7.30 P.M. put
up a deck. Rain
very heavy. very
heavy sea & heavy
swell. which
increased after

10th September



breakfast, got pained
evening heavy
most of morning
went astern & had
a loaf at the
bro heeler. I have
not yet felt it
at all but very
feels bone in back
spasms up to the
wreast. Very
heavy sea after
dinner. up to
top time. Head
sprang up during
the night & throat
kept on quaking
to get to shelter
from the sun.
11th September.

Weather much worse
up heavy sea.
Head & heart giving
me great deal
trouble. Had good

11th September
dinner & good
rest. Read up
Medicine & Surgery
passed Cocon
Island at night
Slept twice decks

12th September
Church & Pargoe
10:30 for the
first time in
the A.T.E. a
collection was
taken I don't
know how
much was taken
the men are only
allowed to draw
3p a week & I
have to buy their
own meals out
of that nearly
every tea time
as they are given
about 10p a day
little for their
evening meal.

12th September

Several runners
as to when we
shall reach Albany
saying Sunday best
but it solely depends
on the weather what
is not to favour all
had good 3 games
of bridge won
2 out of 3
Spiked unfortunately
horns next morning

13th 14th 15th Sept

Same procedure.

Nothing of any
importance. Spia.

now. on 15th we all
mustered in our
respective units

16th September

Our Port engine
which has been
out of action for
some time was
set in motion &
we are now
doing an increased
speed we are
now about a week
out from Albany.

17th September 1915.

Nothing of any importance
Slept well in
afternoon. Western
Australia. Reaching
for landing. Rumour
shots are all the

 Nothing of any importance
 on 19th we had a
 burning at San Juan
 dida from Gallapagos
 Tuberculous.

22nd September 1915.
 Orderly Sergeant had
 a very busy day
 several times wishing
 to go away. I was
 out of it yet.

Hottel Island
 in sight at 1.30 P.M.
 The mantle 14 miles
 further on entered
 Break water 3 P.M.
 Governor expected to
 come aboard, we
 were about 1/4 mile from
 wharf astern & a big
 on board a gale
 Wind started to blow
 & we started to go before
 the tug had time to
 get assistance we were
 blown into the wharf

22nd September 1915.
 the rudder striking
 the wharf but no
 damage was done
 beyond a little woodwork
 being smashed. 2000
 Crowns were on shore
 including a Guard.
 to look after is on
 board. So as one woman
 no take French leave
 The orderly Officer
 Self expected to be.
 going ashore, but
 Slack did not turn
 our way. We landed
 on 23rd. The Fremont
 wharf lay on our
 Starboard side.
 We were cheered
 by a huge crowd.
 after arrival being expected
 Oranges Tobacco Cakes
 Eggs etc were thrown
 by the people to us on
 board & several people
 were on board &
 distributing the tidias

22nd Sept

brarily Sept. 5.
 There no chance of
 entertaining the people
 which I should have
 liked to. I was given
 chocolate. Cigars, etc.
 Cakes, oranges, which
 were appreciated
 after the same old
 to this day after day
 on board. The
 West Indian people
 are most hospitable

 never forget. Some men

 was good for them
 some got liquer
 aboard & some
 climbed down
 ropes & rope ladders

 the guard turned
 out some soon on
 the spot, when the man
 was on the wharf he
 at once attacked

 returned to his bed
 without being seen
 by my officer on
 board.

23rd September 1915

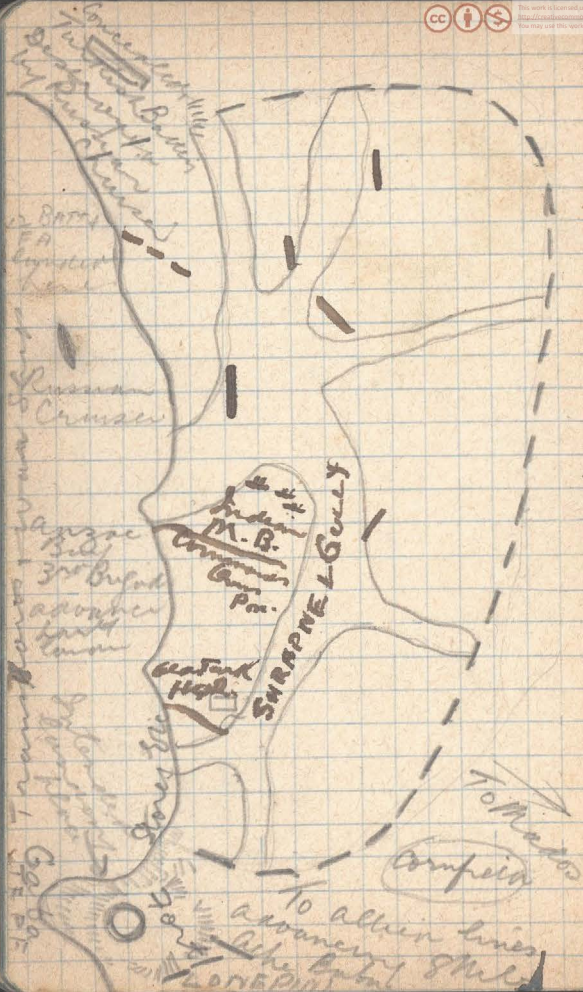
