The Centre contains 26 weatherboard staging quarters, not lower grade Nissan huts, and are neat and tidy in appearance. Migrants eat cafeteria style in a communal dining room and relax in a large recreation room. The kitchen served 36,000 meals in the last year. The lawns and garden beds are kept neat and migrants comment on enjoying their surroundings. Photographs show a picture of the quarters, a family of seven happily smiling, a woman serving herself in the kitchen, and 19 month old Lynn Blyth wide eyed as she arrives from Dundee, Scotland.
