			<b>RIGHT SECTOR:</b> At 5 a.m. Major ELWELL reported per Despatch Rider that he needed at least 50 stretchers, 2 more large cars and two bearer Subdivisions. A.D.M.S. was at once notified He gave permission to send up the two Reserve Bearer Subdivisions asked for (11th. Aust. Field Ambulance) These were sent and reached Major ELWELL at 7. 30. a.m. A Message from Major ELWELL, timed 5 a.m., advising that 100 stretchers instead of 50 urgently needed, and asking for all available 'Sunbeams'. A.D.M.S. advised of this. Three 'Sunbeams' at once sent to Major ELWELL. Further message from Major ELWELL timed 5.25. a.m. insisting on 100 stretchers exclusive of previous requisitions, and asking for Horsed Ambulances. This message arrived at 6 a.m. Also advised that 80 stretcher cases 'banked up' at Quarry A.D.S. (P.7.c.1.9.) 25 stretchers sent to him at once. A further message timed 6 a.m. received advising that No. 3787 Pte. MAWBEY, W.N., 13th. Aust. Field Ambulance a casualty (G.S.W. Leg.) Also that stretcher cases were reaching him much faster than going out. (90 stretcher cases waiting at this time) A.D.M.S. was advised at 6 a.m. that Major ELWELL was most insistently asking for more stretchers a that 25 had been sent, but that 75 more demanded and that there were only 30 held at A.D.S. Message timed 7.30.a.m. from Major ELWELL that 25 stretchers had arrived, but that he still needed 100 urgently and that the cars were making little impression on cases. At 7.45. Major STEELE was instructed to send 20 or 30 stretchers from his quota direct to Major ELWELL. 6 more were sent from A.D.S. 4th. Aust. Inf. Bde. Headquarters were situated at same location as Major ELWELL's. H.Q. and the Brigadier seeing the temporary congestion of stretcher cases there, independently sent wires to D.H.Q. about the accumulation of the cases, though the cases were bringing cases away very well and rapidly to A.D.S.

A.D.S., N.4.c.9.2. 4th.	1918 July		<p><b>RIGHT SECTOR: (Continued)</b></p> <p>As the sending of three more Sunbeams to Major ELWELL had depleted the cars available for evacuation to M.D.S. from A.D.S. three horsed ambulance wagons were put on to this work. Six other horse ambulances were put on collecting walking wounded along the road to AUBIGNY. At 9 a.m. all 9 horsed ambulances were sent forward to Major ELWELL's post to supplement his cars.</p> <p>At 9.30.a.m. A.D.M.S. advised that he had obtained 50 stretchers from D.D.M.S. These were sent to Major ELWELL immediately on arrival. At 10.30.a.m. A.D.M.S. sent 4 large ambulance cars of 3rd. Aust. Division to supplement all those sent forward to Major ELWELL. They were sent forward immediately on arrival.</p> <p>At 10.30.a.m. A.D.M.S. sent 100 blankets from 4th. Aust. Field Ambulance. All cases (Walking Wounded and stretchers) were by this time coming into the A.D.S. very rapidly and in good condition.</p> <p>Through the help of 4th. Aust. Inf. B.H.Q. six pontoon wagons were obtained and on these Major ELWELL sent six stretcher cases each - the stretchers being crossways on the ramps. Only German wounded were transported in this way. They made two trips each and helped considerably.</p> <p>At 12.30.p.m. Major ELWELL advised that no stretchers or blankets were required, that he hoped to be clear in one hour, and that very few cases were coming into his post.</p> <p>At 1.30. p.m. Major ELWELL advised that he needed no more Horsed Ambulances and that the four large cars of 3rd. Aust. Division could be cut out of his run. All these vehicles were then switched on to the stretcher cases evacuation to M.D.S. as these had been banking up at A.D.S. owing to the marked rapidity of their arriving down from forward posts.</p> <p>At 3.5.p.m. the O.C., was able to advise that Major ELWELL was quite clear.</p> <p>It will be seen from reference to the Operations No. 1 (Order) Appendix No. 1.) that the disposition of cars Blankets, stretchers and personnel had been worked out to meet all reasonable requirements for evacuation during the battle. From the foregoing it is seen that a temporary congestion occurred at the QUARRY M.L.P. Major Elwell's H.Q. This was due to the following causes:-</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The abnormal and unique rapidity of the clearance of wounded from R.A.P's. to the M.L.P. (P.7.c.1.9.) This was due to some hundreds of Boche Prisoners being employed as stretcher bearers. Many Infantrymen voluntarily carried also and a few stretcher cases were also brought down by Tanks. Our own stretcher bearers could not have got the cases back in one half the time. The the same reasons there ensued a shortage of stretchers. The stretcher cases were mostly severely wounded (shell wounds) and being 'banked up' at the M.L.P. represented a similar number of stretchers out of action for reimbursement of the bearers as they came in. The wounded commenced to reach the M.L.P. at 3.50. a.m. Actually Major ELWELL's clearance was a very rapid one for, by 12.30.p.m. h3 had got away more than 800 cases and by 1.30. p.m. 900 cases. After 1 p.m. only a few cases trickled into the M.D.P.

LEFT SECTOR ( i/c MAJOR D.M. STEELE, MC.)

The employment of the alternative routes was not found necessary. Two 'Ford' cars ran from VAUX to SMITH'S FARM and four 'Sunbeams' thence to A.D.S. These coped easily with the casualties. By 10 a.m. about 100 casualties had passed through. Very very dribbled through thereafter.

A.D.S. (N.4.c.9.2.) The first casualties arrived at 4.30.a.m. and thence continuously with increasing rapidity. The walking wounded were easily coped with. The standard dugout proving most suitable for the purpose. The lorries got away well and ~~average~~ averaged about 3½ hours for the trip to C.C.S. and back. Stretcher cases banked up until about 2 p.m. as the vehicles available could not keep up with the rapidity of their arrival.

At 3.5. p.m. O.C. was able to advise A.D.M.S., that Walking Wounded were clear and that stretcher cases rapidly clearing. At 5 p.m. A.D.S. was quite clear, having put through about 930 cases in 10 hours. The proportion of stretcher to Walking Cases being about three to four. There was a marked proportion of abdominal and thigh wounds especially among the German wounded which numbered 180. A noteworthy feature was the very good condition of the wounded generally due to the rapid an evacuation and the good weather.

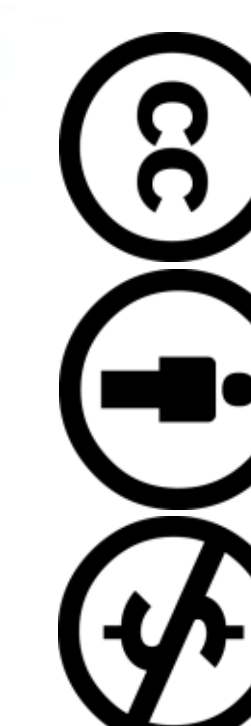

4. One Despatch Rider will be at the disposal of Major ELWELL and push bicycles at Disposal of Officers i/c of each Sector.

5. The Bearer Division of 11th. Aust. Field Ambulance will be held as Reserve at A.D.S.

6. Majors ELWELL and STEELE have discussed with all R.M.O's. arrangements for liaison during advance. A Bearer squad will move forward with each R.M.O. and keep liaison established with Field Ambulance Officer i/c Sector.

7. Ford Cars will work as far forward as practicable.



8. All locations of new R.A.P's. and Posts will be notified promptly to O.C., 13th. Aust. Field Ambulance.
9. In the event of any R.M.O. becoming a casualty, the nearest Bearer Officer will replace him, notifying O.C., 13th. Aust. Field Ambulance immediately.
10. Every Officer, M.C.O., and man taking part in the Advance will be provided with a strip of white material for use in case of his becoming a casualty. This is for tying to the top of the surrounding crops, or to a rifle stuck in the ground, to ensure that casualties will not be lost in the crops.
11. All A.A.M.C. Casualties will be notified to H.Q., of Ambulance as soon as they occur.
12. One water cart will be attached to Major ELWELL's. H.Q. at Quarry P.7.c.1.9.
13. Every care must be taken of stretchers and blankets, particularly in the most forward posts, to avoid loss.  
An ample supply of stretchers, blankets, dressings and splints, has been provided at all posts and R.A.P's.
14. Twenty five(25) petrol tins for the forward carriage of water are at present with Major ELWELL.
15. Gassed cases will be stripped in the open as much as possible and put into pyjamas and sponged with Sod. Bicarb sol. and eyes irrigated with Bicarb. Sol. This will be done forward of A.D.S. if possible.
16. Particular attention will be paid at A.D.S. to carry out instructions regarding American Troops.
17. WALKING SICK: On and after an hour to be named, these will be evacuated direct to C.C.S., unless likely to be fit for duty within two or three days when they will be disposed of as in para 18.
18. DIVISIONAL COLLECTING STATION: has been established at H.19.b.0.6. (12th. Aust. Field Amb.) and all 4th. Aust. Divisional cases likely to be fit for duty within two or three days will be evacuated to this D.C.S. Patients belonging to other Divisions and Corps Troops will be evacuated to C.C.S. Cases admitted and transferred to 12th. Aust. Field Amb. (D.C.S.) will be shown as Transfers to 12th. Aust. Field Ambulance in A. & D. Books and A.F.W., 3185.
19. STRAGGLER POSTS: Officers i/c Sectors will send stragglers to the Straggler Posts, locations of which have already been advised. The Straggler Collecting Station at DAOURG will receive stragglers seen at A.D.S. Medical Officer from A.D.S. will medically examine stragglers when required to do so by C.C. Station.
20. CASES DYING AT MEDICAL POSTS IN FORWARD AREA: will be advised to A.D.S. and recorded in A. & D. Books of W.W.M.D.S.
21. Divisional Burials Officer is in the Forward Area and has been instructed to keep in touch with Medical Posts and arrange for burials.
22. Alternate routes and Posts as already worked out by Officers i/c Sectors will be used as occasion demands.
23. Recommendations for Immediate Awards will be rendered to O.C., 13th Aust. Field Ambulance as soon as practicable.
24. Medical Posts as on 3-7-1918 as shown on appendix.
25. All casualties wearing a tourniquet when leaving Stretcher Cases Cases A.D.S., or W.W.M.D.S., must be accompanied by a Wagon Orderly who will hand the case over, personally, to a Medical Officer.

Report on A.M.C. Constructions works still considered necessary is forwarded please.

A.D.S., N.4.c.9.2. Standard Dugout needs completion of auxiliary chambers and swinging stretcher racks. The erection of the 3rd. Nissen Bow Hut will be commenced tomorrow.

LEFT SECTOR:

Smith's Farm (I.30.b.3.5.) Two Standard Dugouts need swinging stretcher racks.

Quarry R.A.P. (J.28.c.8.9.) Expected to be finished in three or four hours and will then need to be gasproofed and racks placed in position.

B.R.P. (J.32.b.4.8.) This offers fair shelter but needs making much stronger and gasproof to accommodate two squads. Should R.A.P. at J.33.Central be shifted to P.4.d. tonight B.R.P. will be established at J.33.central where accommodation is adequate.

RIGHT SECTOR:

All forward R.A.P.'s. still in need of more permanent construction.

R.A.P. at Pear Trench: is very heavily shelled and will probably be shelled. No B.R.P. at present. When R.A.P. shifted B.R.P. will be established if necessary and any construction notified to you.

B.R.P. P.7.b.5.9. to Left R.A.P. P.9.a.4.4. Shelter for two squads needs to be built. Good bank available.

B.R.P. P.13.d.1.4. to Right R.A.P. P.14.c.9.5. Shelter for two squads needed. No bank available. This B.R.P. is at present in an old trench.

Present HAMLET R.A.P. P.1.a.3.3. Standard Dugout uncompleted. Excavation completed, still needs gasproofing and racks. If not required by Reserve Battalion, it would offer a splendid site for A.M.C. Shelter and reserve bearers.

Quarry P.7.c.1.9. Standard dugout needs completion of chamber and more racks placed in position. Car shelter needs enlarging and deepening into the bank - this will be done by our own men very soon. We occupy only a portion of this dugout (made by Battalion labour) It is eminently desirable to have it reserved for A.M.C. use only in which case it will be suitable indeed for the purpose.

M.R.P. O.15.a.5.7. Standard dugout:- chambers and additional drive to be constructed. At present only two drives. We can supply labour for the work by the 9th. instant. Next to this dugout is an Artillery dugout with two drives, spacious enough to accommodate 50 men. We have taken possession of it since the Artillery headquarters shifted from it three days ago but we may not be able to retain it.

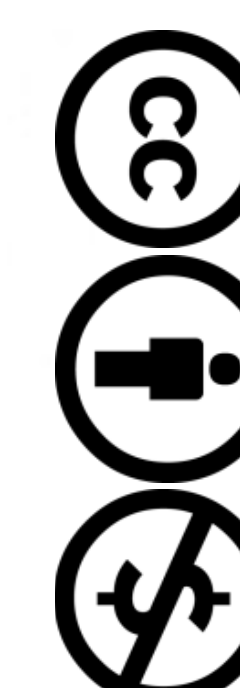

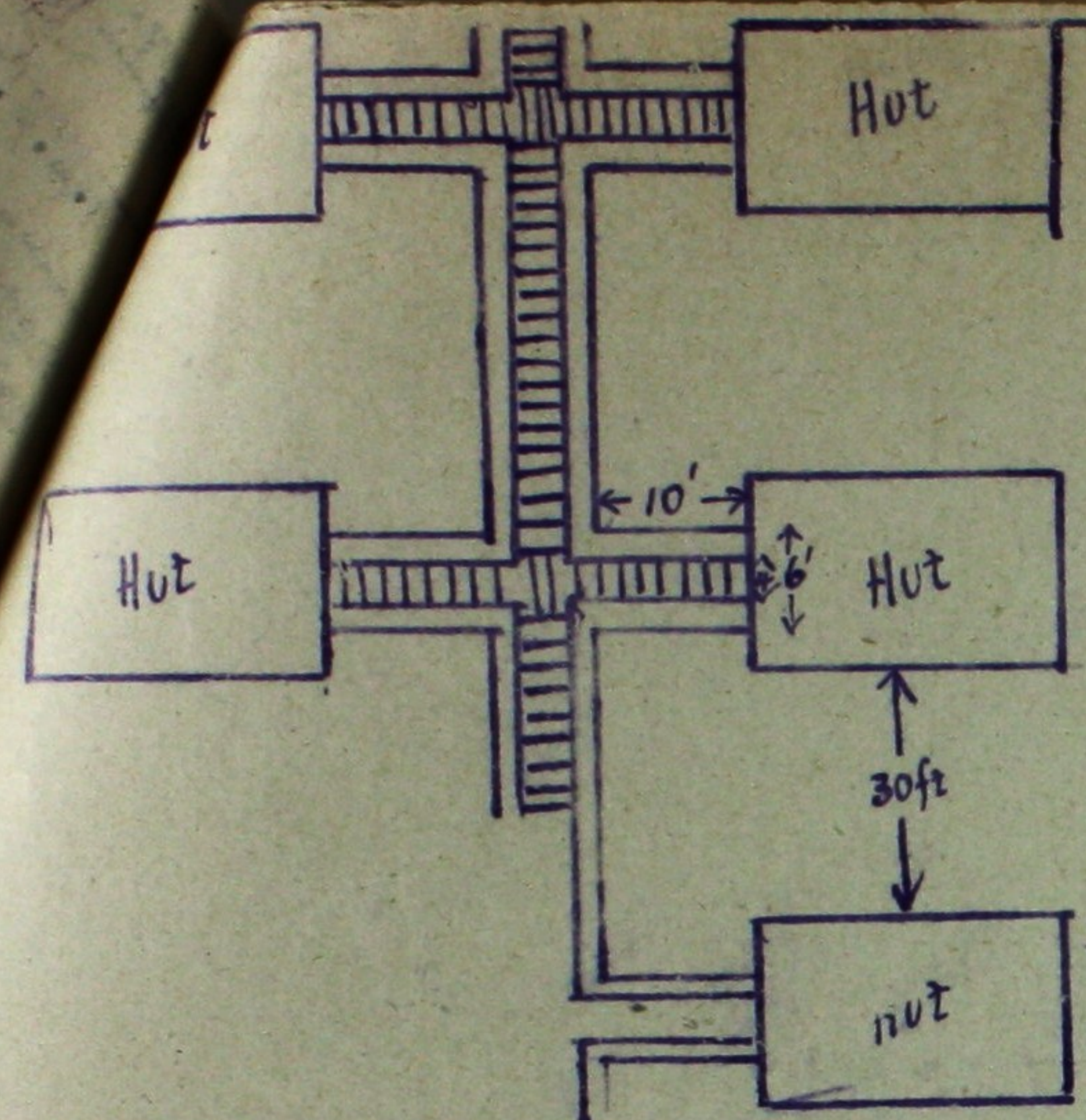

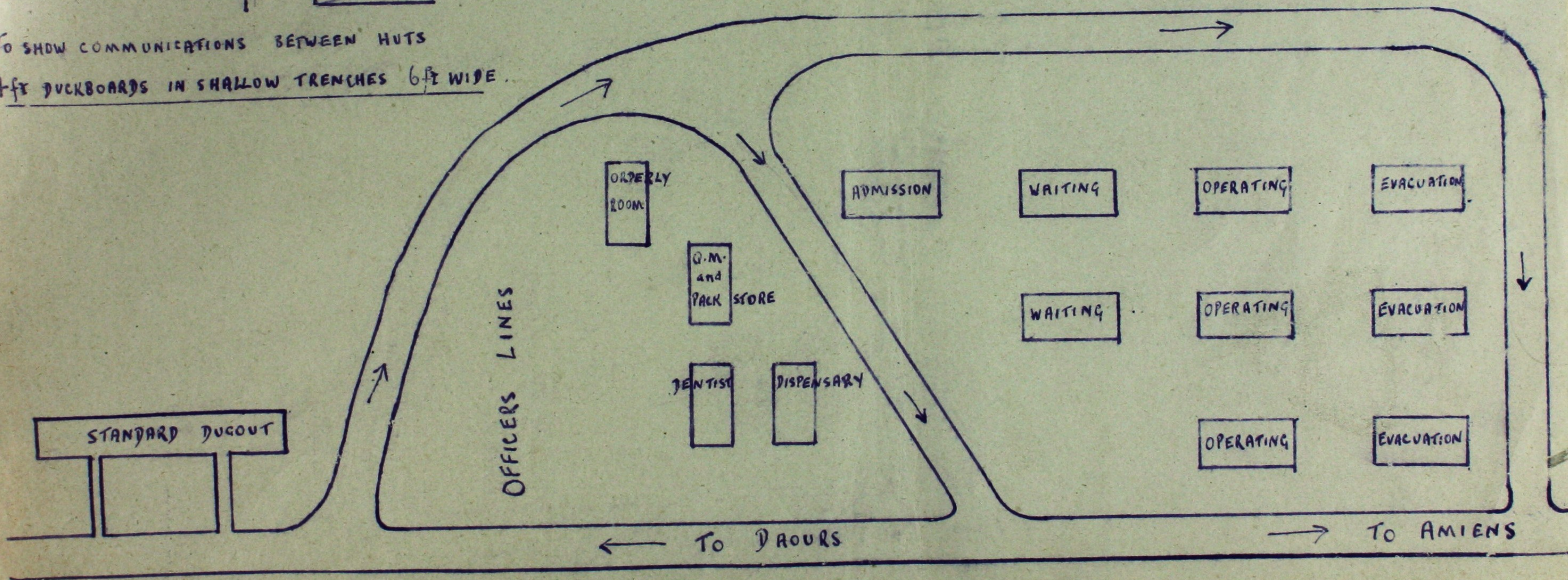
